2022 Alpine Reflection by Alan Morrison



Our trip began with a one-day delay. The delay caused the 12-14 of us from our group to scramble for ourselves which led to a variety of pathways to get there. The joy side of that experience is that we met an older couple on the hotel bus that was delayed on their 50th Anniversary trip to Norway and other Northern European destinations. We talked with a young couple in the seats in front of us on the flight to Munich. Her birthday was our new arrival day. Flight Attendant Corey on the flight from Dulles to Houston approached us telling us that she was originally to be on the flight we were now taking to Munich. She told us to ask for her friend Rosemarie who was the Purser. When we got on the Houston to Munich flight we asked for Rosemarie and gave her the message that Corey sent us, and that Corey said she was to pamper us. Rosemarie brought us 1st class chips and full-height bottle of water (not half heights). All great conversations that we never would have had if not for the delay.



The tour guides and city guides and bus drivers each had their quirky takes on everything. They were an utter delight to listen to as they told their impassioned stories.



I had been in Bavaria 42 years ago and saw many of the Bavarian sites including having been in Oberammergau without any knowledge of their history or the Passion Play until I and a few friends got there. It was the year of the Passion Play, but it was sold out. So, this trip has been on my bucket list ever since. While on that same trip I was also in Innsbruck, I had not been to any of the other locations in Austria, Lichtenstein, or Switzerland.



One of the striking observations from having been here 42 years ago to now was that in the Bavarian and Tyrolean regions great care has been made for much of the newer construction to be in the tradition of the region, while other areas we travelled through have moved much more into modern style construction.

Even with having traveled in Europe and this region before, I am still struck at how young the history of my own country is when compared to other areas of the world. To be in a library where some books date back to 1050 AD. Cathedrals, fortresses, and castles range across the years built in Baroque, Romanesque, Renaissance, etc. – each style speaking its own language.

While in Oberammergau, we purchased a Nativity at one of the little side shops. They were all carved by either the gentleman who waited on us, his brother, or his sister. When all of the sets are gone, their family business of 70 years will be finished. The next generation is doing other things.





The cathedrals were striking. Each so ornate even the small village ones were that way. Hearing the guides talk about them I found myself challenging some of the Protestant biases with which I was raised toward the “unnecessary” spending on the cathedrals. The theology of walking into a grand and glorious cathedral sanctuary that overwhelms you and helps you to realize that God is so much bigger than us. Yet, following the Protestant Reformation, the Protestants were told not to even go in a Roman Catholic cathedral for a brief prayer out of fear that they would lapse back into Catholicism due to the emotional response to the opulence. Whether the design of the cathedral was centered on statues or paintings, each was designed to tell a portion of the Biblical story. Prior to the printing press and subsequent people learning to read, this was the primary teaching methodology to share the Biblical story. Yet, I found the Protestant Churches to be spiritually moving in their own way through their simplicity. And then to be in Zurich where we got to see the churches related to Zwingli and Bollinger as important leaders in the Protestant Reformation.



The Castles of Ludwig were a fun interlude of the trip for me. I’ve been to Linderhof and Neuschwanstein before. What I discovered this time is that as old as so many structures we saw are, these castles are not as old as my future retirement home. In Stroudsburg we also learned the difference between Castles which house a royal family and a Fortress which is relatively ugly but designed to house the whole city for protection at the time of war.



It was striking to see things such as the Lion of Lucern, markers remembering those who died in the Holocaust, plaques on the sides of homes commemorating important persons of science, religion, and the arts such as Dr. Doppler that invented the doppler technology. We even got to see Harry Potter’s Stag (kidding).

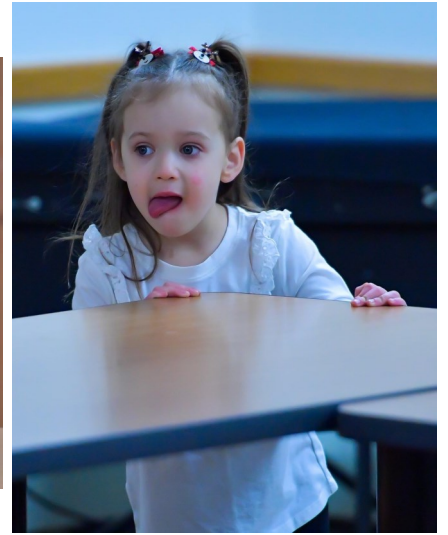

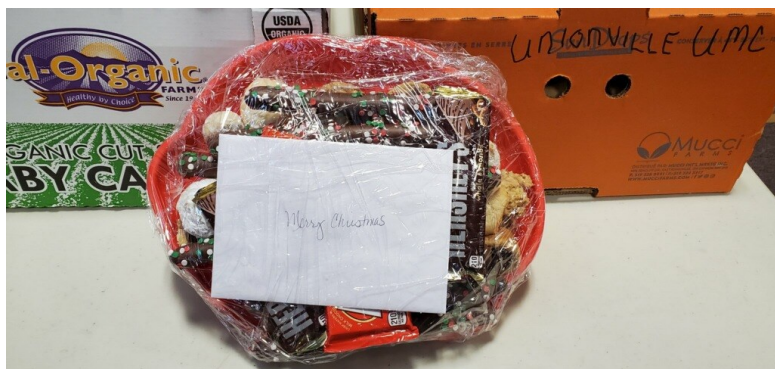

Phoenix Drop-In Center

located at 105 Brighton Ave, Rochester, PA 15074

The Phoenix Center is a peer run drop in center for persons with a history of mental health/co-occurring disorders. The Center is a place for individuals to socialize, relax, enjoy the company and acceptance of others, and gain support in their recovery efforts.

Educational programs, wellness programs, holiday celebrations, and a host of activities are offered at the center. In recent years, increased focus has been on promoting a welcoming environment, developing committees for fundraising and drop-in center governance, and creating more volunteer and employment opportunities through the center.

Phoenix Drop-In Center provides:

- Adults have a safe and supportive place for recreation, education, volunteer and peer support opportunities.
- A variety of activities like Creative Writing, Craft classes, Bingo, pool, and darts
- Opportunity for participation in our Smart Shopper program that includes free transportation to Wal-Mart and Aldi's, recipes, and shopping tips.
- Free lunch to members Monday-Friday at Noon.
- Laundry facilities at a minimal cost and free transportation for members to do their laundry at the center.
- Activities that get members up and moving: Wii bowling, walks, picnics at the park, miniature golf.

Prior to our arrival the kids will make personalized cards for those who utilize the drop in center. Once we are there we will learn what mental health needs are all about then we will be the hands and feet of Jesus by doing what is needed at the drop in center.

May God walk with you and us this coming year.

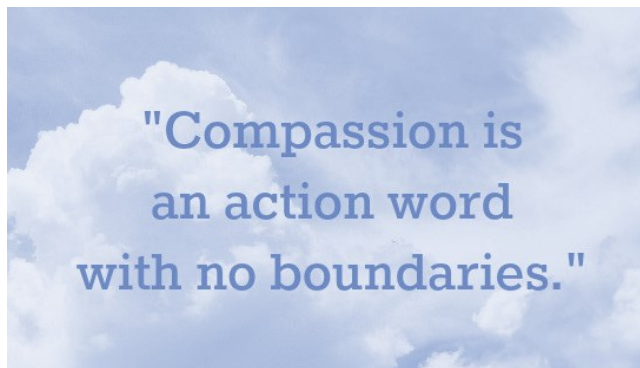
