Welcoming Guests

Hospitality is one of the three areas that our vision discernment process led us to concentrate on. The scriptures call upon us to extend welcome to the strangers among us. Unionville is blessed to have periodic guests in our midst. We've been further blessed by those who have chosen to make Unionville their spiritual home base. The difference in whether a guest decides to come back again and even stick around has to do with feeling welcome. Our words can make all the difference in the world. Thom Rainer, CEO of Church Answers, wrote several years ago an article suggesting seven things to say to guests who come to worship.

- "Thank you for being here." The simplest thing to say is often the best thing to say. It says, I see you here and I'm glad you are here. Another version that can work well whether a first-time guest or a long-time member is "Glad to see you!"
- "Let me help you with that." If someone is struggling with umbrellas, children, bags, & purses, etc., an offer to hold open a door or to help carry something is a huge positive. Of course, that's true with long-time members as well as first-time guests.
- "Please take my seat." It is an uncomfortable thing to enter a sanctuary that you have never been in before. What if I take someone else's seat? Or on a really well-attended Sunday, is there room enough for my family to sit together?
- "Can I show you where you need to go?" Most churches, it is not obvious where to go to find the nursery, restrooms, or small group meeting areas. You usually can tell when someone isn't quite sure where to go.
- "Let me introduce you to ______." People come back again when they feel like they have started to make connections. Make sure the guest has met the pastor. Start connecting them with others nearby. Or maybe they shared something in your first encounter that gives you the ability to connect them with someone that shares that interest.

"Here is my email address. Please let me know if I can help in anyway." – Use this one with discretion. It needs to feel fully comfortable to you and feel appropriate to the encounter you have had so far.

"Would you join us for lunch?" – Again, this must feel appropriate for you and the encounter you have had so far. You also shouldn't be alone in this venture. But what a great way to connect a guest, if there is a group of you going out for lunch.

What are ways that make you feel welcome when you have been a "stranger" in a "foreign land"?

Make Your Summer Break About God by Don Straka

No one should ever take a break from God, his glory, and the mission he gives each of us. When we break for the summer — from Sunday school, small group, community outreach, or wherever you serve in your local church — God still calls us to seek him with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength.

The Bible constantly calls believers to an all-out, full-abandoned pursuit of wisdom. For example, <u>Proverbs</u> <u>2:2–5</u> exhorts, "[Make] your ear attentive to wisdom and [incline] your heart to understanding; yes, if you call out for insight and raise your voice for understanding, if you seek it like silver and search for it as for hidden treasures, then you will understand the fear of the Lord and find the knowledge of God."

This is not a seasonal calling. The summer does not give us permission to pull up a lawn chair and watch the race instead of running the race. When we say we are taking the summer off, we mean something radically different than disengaging from seeking God. Instead, we suspend certain ministry activities or events and fill that time with softball leagues, board game nights, and music in the park.

We're not breaking from God, but swinging, competing, and listening for more of him. Filling our week with these activities does not transport us from engaging in the significant part of the Christian life (Sunday school and service projects) to the insignificant (ice cream cones and Florida vacations). No, it simply moves us from formal to informal (of course never neglecting to meet together in weekly corporate worship).

God designed all of our summer activities so that we would know him more, love him better, and have more fuel to live for his glory.

Dear Friends,

Prayer is a great mystery to me. Never really having studied it, I was amazed by a *Wikipedia* article. It seems that for all of history and before, people have been praying. Prayer takes on hundreds of forms. One of Jesus disciples said, "Lord teach us to pray". Jesus taught prayer by example and with words.

My parents were relatively new Christians, but they were strong in their faith. We prayed at every meal and often before a long car trip. My father's prayers revealed a humble and worshipful spirit in the man I loved so much.

One of my earliest prayers was when my mother helped me pray to accept the Lord Jesus as my Savior. My prayer as a young child opened the gate of heaven and set the course for my life.

My prayer life has been all over the place. In my yourh I cried myself to sleep many nights praying for my grandfather's salvation. Another intense prayer of mine happened as a brand-new pilot trying to land on a narrow African dirt strip in the middle of a huge storm. With no forward visibility, I prayed at the top of my lungs screaming over the sounds of the engine and rain. The Holy Spirit filled the cockpit and the landing was perfect.

My mother used to say (playing off of Einstein's famous thought, "there is no such thing as an atheist in a foxhole") that "there is no such thing as an atheist with a belly ache". Maybe, for me, there is no one answer about how and when to pray. I find myself reluctant to pray for my own health issues. I feel God knows and I can just trust Him completely. Sometimes I am in a constant state of prayer, praying my way through my day and life.

If the roots of our spiritual tree are faith, then prayers must be the flowers -- beautiful and divine. Prayer communication with the Father is welcomed by Him and a comforting reassurance to us. We pray because we need and love God. And He wants to hear from us. Our prayers are heard in heaven.



CLAYTON'S ARMY THANKS YOU!

The Pittsburgh Region Cystic Fibrosis Foundation's Great Strides 5K Walk took place on Saturday May 20. You

probably didn't see anything about it on the local TV news programs – we know that we did not -- but more than 50 teams showed up, walked in the rain, and raised more than \$228,896 for cystic fibrosis research. This was down about \$20,000 from the pre-Covid Walks.

Clayton's Army -- made up of 24 walkers (including 5 year old Clayton) -- raised \$5,861.15 of that total. Nancy and I and the 28 individuals, families, and organizations who supported us donated \$1,002.00 of

We want to thank all of you for your support. Once again, donors contributed anywhere from \$5.00 to \$100.00. You have helped to make a difference. This is especially true when, as we were told, the Federal government provides next to nothing for CF research. In the past five years, more than a dozen treatments have been developed and

approved. The average life-expectancy for people with CF has now risen to almost 50 which is nearly 3 decades longer than it was when David's graduate school roommate was working with CF patients in 1972.

We thank you. Clayton and his parents thank you. And so do the more than 40,000 "kids" (up 10,000 from 5 years ago) who deal with CF every day. You are a blessing!


