Early Lent

The season of Lent begins on February 14th. Lent is the 40 days before Easter not counting Sundays. It is a period in which Christians historically prepare through prayer, penance or repentance of sins, almsgiving, atonement, and self-denial.

Prayer is the act of entering into conversation with God. That conversation may use words, song, or silence. It can take the form of a hymn, recitation of the same words repeatedly, or spontaneous speaking with God. The spontaneous speaking scares so many people, but think of it as simply speaking to God as you might a long-time friend over a cup of coffee. Prayers may include petitions or supplications (asking for something), thanksgiving, and praise.

INSIDE THIS ISSUE

Penance or Repentance of Sins is the acknowledgement that you have done something wrong for which you are sorry about. Confessing our sin opens us up to the hope that comes as forgiveness from God. True repentance calls for changed attitude and behavior. To sin is to miss the mark. To repent is to hit the bull's eye, to stay on target. Acts of penance are sometimes performed to assist one in new behaviors such as devoting time to prayer, reading the Bible, or other spiritual books. These acts may include abstaining (fasting) from food, alcohol, or tobacco.

Almsgiving is the act of charity toward those who are less fortunate. That act can be lived out by giving money or possessions or by volunteering. Throughout the year we support many different special offerings and collections to support local, regional, national, and international ministries as well as ministries. The Compassionate Ministry Food Pantry is a ministry of our own that assists persons in need in our community. Our general fund supports ministry in our community, across Western Pennsylvania, and around the world as well.

Self-Denial is the act of abstaining typically from something one receives enjoyment. Fasting from eating food is one of the major practices of self-denial. Fasting could be for a meal, a day, or longer. The time of fasting is spent in prayer, study, or performing acts of kindness. This is the origin of the practice of "giving up something for Lent". But remember that in giving up something, you should take up some other practice. For instance, you could fast for a meal, donate the cost of the meal to a charity to help others and spend your mealtime reading the Bible and praying.

Jesus!

Lent is a time for us to prepare for Christ in our life. Let us open our hearts to receive Jesus as Lord and Savior. **GIVE YOUR**



The SAFE Corner

The Administrative Council adopted a revised Safe Sanctuaries policy and program for Unionville Church in September 2023. More updates are planned to ensure we provide a SAFE environment for all. Each month we will share a portion of the policy in the newsletter as one of the ways to help everyone in the church to know our process to be safe.



Mandated Reporting

- A) Mandatory Reporters as defined in Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Law (CPSL):
 - All clergy are mandated reporters.
 - All individuals paid or unpaid who are an integral part of a regularly scheduled program, activity, or service that accepts responsibility for a child are mandatory reporters.
- B) Responsibilities Mandated reporters are required to make a report of suspected abuse when they have reasonable cause (witness, suspect, or are told) to believe that a child is a victim of child abuse under any of the following circumstances:
 - They have contact with the child as part of their duties or through a regularly scheduled program activity or service OR
 - They are responsible for the child or work for an agency that is directly responsible for the child OR
 - Someone makes a specific disclosure to the mandated reporter and the child is identifiable. This includes children that the mandated reporter may not know through their duties OR
 - A person 14 years old or older makes a disclosure that he/she has committed child abuse.

C) Reporting

- When a mandated reporter has reasonable cause to suspect that a child is being abused, he or she must immediately make the report by:
 - a) Calling Childline at 1-800-932-0313 and completing a written report on CY-47 Form within 48 hours of making the oral report OR
 - b) Electronically through the Child Welfare Portal.
- Keep a record of the date and time of the report as well as a copy of any email confirmations received regarding the report.
- 3) After making the report to ChildLine, the mandated reporter shall tell the pastor. The pastor will facilitate the cooperation of Unionville United Methodist Church with any investigation and assists the mandated reporter with any concerns he/she may have.
- If the Pastor is the one suspected, after contacting ChildLine, the mandated reporter must contact the Butler District Superintendent.

February 4th—We will be joined by Lois Morrison who will share with us "Dancing in the Rain". Everyday life offers us joy and challenges (sometimes called change). While the event may be beyond our control how we cope is not. Come to explore how you can rediscover peace and hope in the midst of change/grief.

Lois is an ordained minister and served for 30+ years as a Chaplain in various healthcare settings. Before entering ministry she was an Addictions Counselor.

February 11th—We will be joined by Jennifer Thomson and Janice Beaver from the Beaver County Association for the Blind. BCAB provides services for the blind and visually impaired (think Macular Degeneration). They will share information about the agency and the services they provide which include Rehabilitation Education, Support Services, Blindness Prevention, and Children's Programs. They will also provide low vision screening to anyone in attendance who wishes to be screened.

February 18th—We will be joined by our very own Bill Deal who will teach us about Cast Iron Cooking!! Do you enjoy good food, good friends, and good fellowship? Learn how all three can be enjoyed through traditional cast iron cooking. Cast iron cookware has been around for thousands of years, and many claim is the best way to cook. Cast iron is great because you can use it in your oven, on your stove, or you can go old school by cooking over an open fire or with charcoal. This session will cover basic cast iron use and care. No cast iron demonstration is complete without some delicious food to sample and some conversation about how food and fellowship can inspire our faith.

Bill Deal has been an educator for 20 years, starting his career teaching chemistry and then moving into the world of administration, spending over a dozen years as a high school principal.
